Chairperson's Message

Dear INJMer,

June 2012 was a milestone for both INJM and for me personally. It marked a year of work in Tohoku.

Has it already been a year? It's gone pretty quickly. And yet... has it only been a year? I feel like I've been here for years. Ishinomaki has gone from a town living in the very obvious aftermath of a disaster into something.. more complicated. There is no longer a Self Defense Force presence, there are working street lights, most high traffic areas have been cleaned up nicely. The problems and needs are much less obvious.

And that is why it's so important to still be here. **Because** the problems are less obvious. A quick glance at Ishinomaki (and many towns in Tohoku) might reveal that there are now shops in most areas, everyone has a place to live and that everything is business as normal. It won't show the communities which have been torn apart by the random assignment of temporary homes, nor will it show the new makeshift communities (or lack of) that are developing (or not). It's the same for the people who have the possibility of moving back into their old homes, but lack the funds to pay the extremely high fees of contractors needed to repair their homes. The fishermen and small businesses who are refusing to "lose to the tsunami" have come a long way, and already achieved an incredible amount without proper business premises, tools or staff, but none of that is visible from a trip to Sendai (unfortunately for some people Sendai = all of Tohoku).

These people are the ones we will be focusing on supporting this next year. INJM will continue its work in Ishinomaki, but also in various other places such as Minamisanriku and beyond. We are going to be busier than ever!

I hope that you will continue to support us as we move into our second year of operation, and in turn, help us help those who need it. Because when all the cleanup is done and dusted, there's still a mountain of work to do.

Or, to put it another way: It's not just mud.

PROJECT UPDATES

We have been busy... very busy.. the last few months. Back in February 2012 INJM was running about 7 projects, and now that number has increased to 15 not counting smaller intermittent projects. Moreover, the scale of each of these projects has increased as well. Its been possible to organize, plan and implement all of this work thanks to the tireless efforts of our senior staff, Yannick Hiryczuk and Choco Chiba, and our many permanent members and long term volunteers. Tsuna Cafe

INJM's community focused project has been in operation since March 2012 and we are very proud of the results its showing. **Tsuna Cafe** aims at fostering communication and creating new bonds between people displaced by the tsunami and living in temporary housing facilities.

The project has already been launched in 4 places in and near Ishinomaki, and we have organized over 14 events sending over a 100 volunteers to talk and interact with residents. Presently, INJM is concentrating on establishing contact with far and difficult to reach temporary housing communities and we are planning to start more **Tsuna-Cafes** there.

The project is conceived with three main components which will be scheduled based on the needs of the community and suitably modified as our intermediary objectives are achieved:

- Tea & Conversation
- Community Cooking
- Creating Gardens

Spending Locally - Invest in Tohoku's Economy

The 3/11 disaster caused extensive damage to both homes and businesses. A lot of effort is going into rehabilitating people who have lost homes, but gradually the focus is also shifting to recovering and supporting local businesses. A simple way to do this is to buy articles from local vendors. INJM strives to purchase as many articles from local businesses for its operations, as possible. Some example figures are given below, along with the people who we typically use to provide these articles/ services.

INJM's typical monthly bill:

Project-Support Costs

- Transportation – ¥190,000 / month
- Tools & maintenance – ¥35,000 / month

Volunteer-Support Costs

- Food – ¥125000 / month
- Gas (heating, cooking) – ¥34000 / month
- Volunteer house maintenance – ¥26000 / month
- Water – ¥20000 / month
- Electricity – ¥15000 / month

Other breakfast stuff (butter, spices, honey, jam etc) from **Ishinomaki Kazai**, who also donate milk free of charge!

Grants

INJM was recently approved for a grant of 2.46 million yen from the Mitsubishi Corporation Disaster Relief Foundation. The grant will be spent over the next 10 months in support of the local fishing industry.

As mentioned in our last newsletter, INJM received the Akaihane Fund in January 2012. The second phase of the funding will be handed out in February 2012 and we will be applying for further funds in the future. The focus of the Akaihane Fund is on operational costs, purchasing home reconstruction materials and related project costs.

Changing Nature of Volunteering

...a message from the INJM directors

Long-term vs. Short-term volunteers: Some of you have been following INJM's work over the past 12 months, and have come up several times to volunteer and even lead teams. It is then also likely that you would have noticed the changing environment in the tsunami-damaged areas and consequently, the nature of INJM's work.

To set the record straight, there are still large swathes of areas untouched since the tsunami hit. There is still a need for debris to be cleared, houses to be cleaned etc. However, it is getting harder to find and engage these places due to various reasons. Often the owners of the places have not yet decided what they wish to do, or cannot be contacted, or the area is simply too difficult to access. In other cases, the work that could be done by unskilled volunteers has been done (debris clearing for example), and now they need someone with construction or other similar skills to finish the job. At the same time, it is also getting more important to focus efforts on community development and ensuring the emotional and psychological well-being of the people affected by the disaster.

Given this scenario, it is more useful to have volunteers who stay longer, get trained and are more involved in the evolution of projects. It is also great to have volunteers who have special skills; not necessarily in construction, but also in social aspects like communication specialists, masseurs etc.

We really do appreciate that people want to help, and given the right conditions it is possible to find work suitable for large unskilled groups. However, it is likely that such opportunities will become scarce with time.
